

The conference is intended to contribute to building an interdisciplinary transnational network for European Studies across the Nordic countries. Hosted at the Kristiansand campus of the University of Agder in the beautiful south of Norway, it will bring together scholars working on European integration primarily across the Nordic countries from a variety of disciplinary perspectives. The discussants of the scholarly papers will include policymakers and practitioners.

### **Conference topic**

The conference will explore recent developments of "European Differentiated Integration", broadly understood. It is based on the <u>Jean Monnet Centre's focus on differentiation in Europe</u>, including both EU- and non-EU member states, formal and informal arrangements, enhanced integration vs. disintegration, as well as various levels, actors, and policy fields. The geographic focus is not restricted to the Nordic region but encompasses the whole continent.

# **Conference format**

The conference will consist of panels in which papers are presented and discussed. The panels will be put together by the organizing committee based on the themes of submitted abstracts. The conference language is English. We aim at a physical event.

- Ambassador Christian Danielsson (Head of the European Commission's Representation in Sweden; former Director-General of Neighbourhood and Enlargement Negotiations and Deputy Secretary of the European Commission).

### **Invited papers**

We invite papers that focus on differentiated integration in the area of European studies from a variety of disciplinary backgrounds, e.g., law, economics, sociology, political science, history, (political) geography, or papers based on an interdisciplinary approach. All papers must be the result of original research and present recent, unpublished findings. They must be written in English and not exceed 10,000 words. Given the interdisciplinary format of the conference and the objective to include practitioners, we strongly encourage the usage of accessible language. The papers should include a specific section on policy implications. All papers must be submitted by 17 May 2022 and will be stored in a "paper room" that is open only to the participants.

### **Participants**

We invite both junior and senior scholars to participate in the conference. With a view to the network building aim of the conference, participants should be based in the Nordics or have a strong demonstrable research focus on this region.

## Paper proposals

The selection of conference papers will be done by the members of the organizing committee primarily on the basis of submitted abstracts of max. 250 words.
