#### THE WESTERN CAPE HAS DELIVERED FOR YOU



We continue to have the lowest unemployment rate in the country at 25.8%, well below the national average of 34.4%. (Source: QLFS Q2 2021).

This is not good enough for us, and that is why **creating** jobs is a key pillar of our Recovery Plan.

Exports have increased from R127.30 billion to R136.72 billion in 2020, representing a 7.4% annual increase.

To boost economic growth and provide better services, we have spent R19.2 billion on infrastructure since the 2019/20 financial year.

We are the **only** provincial government to maintain our outstanding track record of paying suppliers on time.

According to the Global Financial Centres Index, Cape Town (ranked 62nd) is South Africa's leading financial centre.

In 2019/2020, R621 million
in economic savings were
assessed due to the interventions
of the Western Cape's Red
Tape Reduction Unit.

In 2020/21, 17 investment projects worth R4.37 billion were secured by Wesgro's Investment Promotion Unit, creating 1830 jobs.

So far in 2021/22, investments worth R5.7 billion were realised by the team, which will help create 4 205 job opportunities.

We are South Africa's most successful

province in terms of building plans approved, both in terms of square metres, and in terms of value.

We are South Africa's tourism capital, with over R12 billion in direct tourism spend since 2019.

Cape Town topped the 2021 Travel + Leisure's World's Best Awards for the number one city in the Middle East and Africa.

We have unlocked R2.1 billion

in provincial funding for the Saldanha Bay Industrial Development Zone, since 2014/15, helping to drive economic growth.





In 2019/20, before the major impact of the COVID-19 pandemic on international conferencing, the CTICC contributed R4.9 billion to the provincial economy and created 11 367 direct/indirect jobs.

It is now legal in 24 municipalities to produce Solar PV energy, with 19 of these municipalities allowing you to be compensated for feeding this back into the grid.

A successful Request for Information for the Municipal Energy Resilience (MER) initiative has been issued, which has solicited information from more than 100 potential energy generation projects.

A MER fund to assist municipalities with development plans for financially sustainable renewable energy projects has also been launched.

The amount of Solar PV installed in the province has increased from 18MW in 2015/16 to 167 MW in 2019/20.

There has been a total investment of R142 million in the Atlantis Special Economic Zone for Green Technology since 2019, which attracts investment into the Green Economy.

1 166 full-time jobs were created in the Business Process Operating (BPO) sector through our Work and Skills programme in the last financial year.

We launched the first public private partnership BPO Academy of Excellence in partnership with the College of Cape Town, the National Skills Fund, the City of Cape Town and the BPO Industry.

Our Department of Transport and Public Works has created over 13 100 work opportunities across the roads and public works portfolios since 2019.

The Department of Human Settlements created a total of 1993 job opportunities while providing training to 212 young people since 2019.

We established a Port Task Team, bringing together stakeholders from across the port logistics value chain to solve challenges facing the Port of Cape Town.

### SUPPORTING THE ECONOMY DURING THE PANDEMIC FOR YOU

We developed and distributed 11 000 business safety kits to enable SMMEs in all 30 municipalities to continue to operate safely.

Our COVID-19 Business Relief Fund assisted 249 businesses negatively impacted by the pandemic.
Over R38 million was provided through this fund, supporting 2 111 jobs.

We implemented the Supplier Development Programme, which assisted 11 businesses.

Support provided to chambers active in the metro and across districts assisted 467 small businesses with capacity building and information awareness programmes, resilience training, demand research surveys, mentorship and outreach assistance.

### SUPPORTING THE ECONOMY DURING THE PANDEMIC FOR YOU

R5 million was allocated to a Tourism Product Development Fund, which assisted 11 new tourism products, creating R15 million worth of funding and 300 job opportunities.

We assisted over 8 000 tourists that needed to be repatriated during lockdown, ensuring a pleasant experience to encourage future tourism.

We reached nearly tourism leaders and businesses through 5 tourism webinars and hosted 3 workshops to assist tourism businesses to adapt to COVID-19 industry protocols.

We implemented the Wine Tourism Worker Stipend project valued at R12 million to support and maintain 1 362 workers at 254 businesses in the wine tourism industry.

With our partners, we supported the lobbying efforts against South Africa remaining on the United Kingdom's Red List.

Wesgro launched major domestic and international tourism campaigns, reaching millions of people in our key source markets.

702 artists were funded through our relief funding as a response to the major impact of lockdown on the sector.

### GROWING AGRICULTURE RESPONSIBLY FOR YOU

We have established a new climate change unit in the Department of Agriculture, and we have appointed a Climate Change Scientist to run it.

We opened the new indigenous tree nursery at Worcester Veldreserve and will provide farmers with trees to replace the alien trees they've removed as part of the Alien Clearing Programme. At this nursery, 12 000 trees are annually produced, and with the assistance of farmers and various other organisations, the trees are planted back into our river systems.

We're the leading province for Conversation Agriculture, with 51% of all crop-livestock farmers in the Western Cape having fully adopted this way of farming = 304 866 hectares. The number of farmers adopting Conservation Agriculture has grown by 15% from 2015 to 2021.

Since 2019 we have rehabilitated 4.9 6.45 hectares of agricultural land and created 2 295 green jobs. The removal of invasive alien plants increases the yield of the system and prevents water loss.

Between the 2019/20 and 2020/21 financial years, we provided over R179 million in drought relief. This supported 3 905 farmers, including 1 951 smallholder/subsistence farmers.

We are the only province with a weather monitoring network set up to monitor access defined zones and linked to a smartphone app.

#### SUPPORTING LAND REFORM FOR YOU

We supported 110 Land Reform projects during 2019/21 to the value of R130 million. For the year 2021/22, 71 projects have been identified, with estimated support of R104 million.

The success rate of land reform projects in the Western Cape increased from 62% in 2013 to 72% when the evaluation was completed in 2017.

As part of our Provincial Safety Plan, 851 Law Enforcement Advancement Programme officers have been deployed to areas with the highest rate of murder in the province.

An additional 233 officers are currently in training, bringing the total deployment to the over-1 000 mark.

As of July 2021, deployment of LEAP officers has increased to 24/7, as part of a shift system. This means consistent visible policing in areas most impacted by violence.

#### **BUILDING SAFER COMMUNITIES FOR YOU**

3 K9 units have been established and supported by the WCG. Between 2019 and 2021, over R24 million has been transferred to respective municipalities for this.

Since the start of the 2019/20 financial year, 2 347 youth have been trained at the Chrysalis Academy, which focuses on youth development.

As part of the expansion of this programme into communities, we have funded the appointment of 11 Youth Hub Ambassadors to provide further support to graduates.

We have conducted police inspections at all 151 police stations since the start of the term.

We launched, through our Department of Transport and Public Works, a specialised interception unit and highway patrol to respond to high-risk events. So vehicles in the existing fleet have been repurposed for this.

We are the only province that tracks alcohol-related harms at emergency centres across the province. The number of emergency centres monitored through this programme has increased from 4 siles to 21. This data provides critical insights that will enable interventions to reduce alcohol-related harms and violence in our communities.

We have to date submitted policing needs and priorities reports to the National Minister of Police, to push for more resources for the province.

The Office of the Police
Ombudsman has investigated
3 344 cases to date.
In terms of the Western Cape's
Community Safety Act, this
office is responsible
for investigating police
inefficiencies by the
SAPS, ensuring better
service delivery.

The WCED co-chairs a range of safety focused meetings to ensure safety of our learners and teachers. This includes the Provincial Joint Operational and Intelligence Structure and Priority Committee on School Safety with SAPS.

1963 victims of crime and violence accessed safe accommodation that is supported by the Western Cape.

Since the start of the 2019/2020 financial year, 41 School Resource Officers were deployed to 62 schools as part of the Safe School Project. This project is implemented by the City of Cape Town in partnership with the WCG to deploy school resource officers in high crime areas.

Since the 2019/20 financial year, we have accredited 405 Neighbourhood Watch structures, with R2.9 million in support being provided.
10 000 Neighbourhood Watch members have been vetted to keep communities safe.

Our Court Watching Brief unit, set up to monitor police conduct and efficiency in criminal matters at district courts, has monitored 1 422 cases in 42 courts since the start of the 2019/2020 financial year.

A dedicated Gender Based Violence Implementation Plan has been adopted. The number of Gender Based Violence Shelters supported by the WCG increased from 19 to

An additional 30 new GBV social workers have been deployed to hotspot areas to assist women in need in the evenings and on the weekends.

#### **FOCUSSING ON RURAL SAFETY FOR YOU**



We established a Rural Safety Monitoring Dashboard, as part of the Rural Safety Desk. This is the first of its kind in the South African agricultural sector.

The Rural Safety Desk has so far recorded 40 incidents, which receive SAPS case numbers, and are followed up through the Department of Community Safety Court Watching Brief Unit.



### DELIVERING QUALITY HEALTHCARE SERVICES FOR YOU

95% of residents are within a 5km radius of healthcare services. In the City of Cape Town, 92% of people are also within a 10km radius of a District Hospital.

Since 2019, we have nearly spent **R729 million** on new healthcare infrastructure and **R658 million** on existing infrastructure maintenance.

We increased the number of Chronic Dispensing Unit sites, where stable patients can collect medicines by courier, from 6 000 in 2019 to 8 000 currently.

We increased the number of people receiving monthly medication from this unit to 430 380 with a total number of 5 164 567 parcels delivered for 2020/21.

A total of 642 new bursaries has been awarded to medical students across various disciplines for the last three financial years and 2 054 maintained since the start of 2019/20.

We're the **first province** to have a unique patient number across all our patients attending all our public health facilities.

We're the first to have our public hospital and primary healthcare digitised, including 265 primary healthcare centres, 181 mobile posts, 51 acute and specialised hospitals, 28 intermediate care facilities, 49 EMS stations, 17 FPS laboratories and 2 oral health centres.

To ensure rural access to healthcare, our HealthNet patient transport system operates at 230 pick-up points across the province. Every year over 105 000 patients are transported to healthcare facilities, through this R90 million service which is unique to our province. During the global pandemic, we have expanded our pick-up points to areas closer to our communities to accommodate curfew and lockdown regulations.

The WCG Health was the only dept to receive a clean audit in 2019/20. It has now received 3 successive clean audits.

### FIGHTING COVID-19 TO SAVE LIVES AND JOBS FOR YOU

**Our Contact** Centre called 216 146 residents infected with COVID-19 to advise on positive tests, assess health status and comorbidities, refer to Q&I facilities, and escalate to medical services.

20 747 diabetic residents were assigned to the Health team for careful COVID-19 infection monitoring through our **VECTOR** project. The 8 418 high-risk diabetics monitored experienced an 80%+ recovery rate.



We appointed 839 additional staff to ensure enough human resources for our COVID-19 response.

To be transparent on COVID-19 data, we launched the COVID-19 public facing dashboard. This site received over 3 million views from 167 countries. The dashboard won the

Africa Tech Award for Best use of Technology in the Public Sector 2020.

## FIGHTING COVID-19 TO SAVE LIVES AND JOBS FOR YOU

We built the biggest COVID-19 field hospital in Africa in just 6 Weeks, and we opened 'Hospitals of Hope' at Brackengate and in Mitchells Plain.

We made 1 625 field hospital beds available for our health platform to respond.

We worked with Doctors Without Borders to open a dedicated 60-bed field hospital in Khayelitsha in 2020.

Groote Schuur Hospital and Tygerberg
Hospital were the first to publish
prospective observational research
on the use of high-flow nasal oxygen
(HFNO) in the treatment of severe
COVID-19 pneumonia.
At the time, this was the largest
prospective observational study
published in a peer-review journal.

To date, over 2 million medicine parcels have been delivered directly to people's homes in order to protect vulnerable people during the COVID-19 pandemic.

### DELIVERING A WORLD-CLASS VACCINE PROGRAMME FOR YOU

We're currently the leading province for vaccination coverage, with over 42% of people over 18 having received at least one dose of the vaccine (as of mid-October 2021).

We launched an interactive vaccination registration public facing dashboard to monitor provincial vaccine take-up.

Our Contact Centre managed 19 524 inbound queries on vaccinations to help improve access to provincial sites.

We were the first to implement COVID-19 vaccinations of undocumented people (330 to date) as part of our outreach to vulnerable communities.

We have prepared 1 120
vaccination sites across the
province and employed over
1 449 staff to deliver a worldclass vaccination service.

The Vaccination Centre
of Hope at the CTICC
has already surpassed
100000 vaccinations.
It is a pioneering publicprivate partnership between
the WCG, Discovery and the
City of Cape Town.

The Athlone Vaccination
Centre of Hope is our first
drive-through site with
5 dedicated lanes.
The site has the capacity
to administer over
4 000 vaccinations
a day.

### ADVANCING THE EARLY CHILDHOOD DEVELOPMENT SECTOR FOR YOU

Over 60 000 children at ECD facilities are subsidised from our funding.

To support the safe re-opening of the ECD sector, we provided PPE to 2 243 ECD facilitators and 20 833 children. This enabled over 3 194 ECDs to open by 2021. Over R10 million was prioritised for this support.

We were the on v province that continued to pay subsidies to funded ECDs during Lockdown, even after they were ordered to close.

While ECDs remained closed. many used their subsidies to continue providing meals to the children which provided critical humanitarian support.

We are the only province to achieve more than 600 points for both reading and mathematics according to the wide-ranging SACMEQ 4 report.

The results indicate that we achieved 72.7% in advanced reading compared to 36.1% nationally. This is well ahead of the second ranked province (Gauteng) at 54%.

We are dedicated to delivering quality education in line with our pro-poor priorities, with 61% of all Western Cape schools being "no-fee" schools. This includes the additional assistance of 244 quintile 4 and 5 schools to become "no-fee" schools.

The Western Cape Education Department has budgeted exemption to help learners from disadvantaged communities to attend fee-paying schools, far exceeding any other province. province to feed learners during lockdown, delivering between 6 April and 12 May 2020. The North Gauteng High Court ruled that the other provinces had failed in their statutory duty to

The bachelor pass rate in the Western Cape has improved by 11.9% since 2009 from 31.9% to 43.3%, the highest rate ever.

The pass rate in Quintile 1-3 schools (which are no fee schools) has dramatically increased from an average of 56.9% in 2009 to 70.1% in 2020.

The quality of the pass rate has also increased significantly in these schools with 27.2% receiving bachelor passes in 2020, compared to only 9.9% in 2009.

Learner retention between Grade 10 and Grade 12 has steadily increased since 2009. The Western Cape continues to retain more learners than any other province.



We continue to have the highest Mathematics and Physical Sciences pass rates in the country.

In the latest Trends in International Mathematics and Science Study (TIMSS) 2019, we achieved the nignest scores in the country for both Mathematics and Science. The province ranks between 6 and 8 places higher on the international ranking than South Africa as a whole in mathematics and science.

64% of Mathematics learners and 60% of Science learners have achieved basic mathematical/scientific knowledge, with the best improvements occurring in the lowest performing schools.

We have established a Schools Evaluation Authority (SEA) to entrench accountability and transparency in public education. The SEA independently evaluates public schools, with a focus on teaching and learning in the classroom.

18 full evaluations have been conducted to date, with reports being published online for parents to see how a school is performing.

The SEA has also further conducted 78 COVID-19 evaluations to determine if health and safety measures are being followed in schools.



We have invested over R1.6 billion in eLearning over the last 5 years. To date, we have also delivered:
1 297 schools that have broadband connectivity
237 schools have stipend alternatives to broadband
733 schools have Local Area Networks (LAN) installed.

With a further 553 schools with partial access installed, 1320 computer labs established, 8823 smart classrooms, and 229 ICT suites.

Our Western Cape E-portal offers access to thousands of e-resources to our learners.

To date there are 28 700 e-resources, 25 000 daily visitors with 54.1% being users from the Western Cape, with 45.9% being users from other provinces.

We have also established an e-Library that has also been created with thousands of free resources to download in all three provincial languages.

SCHOOL

We have built, on average, 12 schools and 209 new classrooms for every year since 2009. This amounts to 156 new schools and 2 714 new classrooms to date.

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Since 2015, on average, 55 schools' benefit from scheduled maintenance each year.

We have also proven to promote water reliance and saving energy in schools around the province. The WCED's drought intervention utilises alternative water supply sources coupled with installation of smart metering and restrictors.

1 099 water storage tanks have been installed, 234 boreholes have been repaired and 403 boreholes were connected to water tanks and ablutions. 112 leak detectors were installed.

The department has also installed smart water meters at 350 schools, which resulted in millions of litres of water being saved and schools considerably reducing their municipal billions.

The WCED is now assisting 91 schools by providing a subsidy to cover the cost to install smart water meters.

We embarked on a project with Stellenbosch University to replace light bulbs at schools with more energy-efficient, LED bulbs to reduce costs. 25 poor schools have so far benefited.

have been approved at our schools in order to lessen their dependence on the grid and become more energy efficient.

To empower our citizens and address the problem of food security, 500 of our schools (almost a third) now have food gardens.

### CREATING OPPORTUNITIES FOR THE YOUTH FOR YOU

Between 2019 and 2021, over **R72 billion** has been spent on child and youth-related services, including skills training, e-learning, internships, bursaries, infrastructure, education opportunities, early childhood development and child protection service.

The number of YearBeyond opportunities created has increased to 514 in the last financial year. We plan to increase the opportunities to 957 over 2021/22.

The YearBeyond programme offers 18 to 25-year olds the opportunity to get practical work experience and skills for them to be able to access future employment opportunities while also giving back to their communities. 208 internship opportunities have been created since the inception of the Premier's Advance of Youth programme in 2012. This includes opportunities created in 2021. which is being funded with an allocation of R37 million.

The Western Cape's After School Programme adapted to lockdown restrictions by providing @home physical learning resources for learners and online portals for practitioners. In the last year, we have set up an online portal and training and this will be strengthened by further funding of R3.1 million for the 2021/22 financial year.

We have increased the number of operational youth cafés to 12. These cafés seek to provide youth with a platform to access skills and personal development training, economic and social development opportunities, and spaces to express themselves at a local and global scale.

Despite the impact that COVID-19 had on in-person training, 12 229 youth participated in skills development programmes in the 2020/21 financial year. This is an increase from the 5 600 supported in 2009.

#### CREATING HOUSING OPPORTUNITIES FOR YOU

We have provided 29 083 housing opportunities for people in the Western Cape since 2019.

We plan to deliver a total of 21 363 Social Housing units through various projects planned across various regions over the next 10 years. These will be implemented in partnership with municipalities and the Social Housing Regulatory Authority.

We spent **R2.6** billion of the Human Settlements
Development Grant on contractors in targeted groups, which includes women and youth, for the last 2 financial years.

Our housing database app, a first for South Africa, has been downloaded 3 154 times, with 423 new housing demand cases registered, 365 personal detail updates received and an average of 73.75% of cases opened per month from June-September 2021.

#### CREATING HOUSING OPPORTUNITIES FOR YOU

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We assessed the demand for the 'rent-to-own' programme:
236 households had completed Income and Expenditure
Surveys, which were screened by financial institutions.

The outcome of the demand research indicated 37 beneficiaries are considered creditworthy by the financial institutions and can apply for a bond immediately. 38 additional beneficiaries can be assisted througha consumer readiness programme.

The Western Cape Department of Transport and Public Works is assisting in creating housing opportunities closer to economic centres, with 7 sites in either planning, design or construction phase.

Since 2019, we have handed over 15 144 title deeds to recipients.

The Western Cape's 'Asset
Finance Reserve Fund'
has been established with
the primary objective of
facilitating affordable
housing opportunities
for those earning between
R3 501-R22 000/month.
To date, 3 applications
have been received
and are currently
being evaluated.

A vital component contributing to housing delivery, is the Human Settlement's Department's Catalytic and Priority projects. This, upon completion, will yield just over 105 000 housing opportunities by 2022.

#### CREATING HOUSING OPPORTUNITIES FOR YOU

The Conradie site construction of 431 units for social housing in phase 1 is nearly complete and tenanting will start from November 2021.

FLISP construction of the first block has commenced and is on track for completion by June 2022, with 266 units being constructed and already sold out.

The construction of 148 open market units will commence before the end of 2021 and is dependent on sales. The first block already has 65% of its units sold.

The Belhar site has delivered **629** social housing units and 945 affordable housing (FLISP) units to date. The University of the Western Cape has entered a partnership for the provision of student accommodation within the precinct. This site has also completed bulk sewerage, water and road infrastructure which includes the servicing of the site earmarked for a 550-bed hospital.

We are in the process of drafting an Inclusionary Housing Policy Framework; this will help municipalities facilitate the inclusion of more affordable housing units in developments in their municipal areas.

## BRINGING LIBRARY AND ARCHIVE SERVICES CLOSER TO YOU

We have built 4 new libraries between 2019 and 2021, in Du Noon, Elim, Koekenaap and Brandwag.

We have also upgraded libraries, namely in Worcester, Noordhoek (Bergrivier), John Steyn (Ceres) and Harold Krumm (Saldanha).

Over 223 rural libraries in 24 municipalities are connected to high-speed internet, ensuring improved access for rural communities.

We have set aside R1.35 million for the implementation of a new Archives Website that will enable researchers to access our archival records online.

The Western Cape has issued

3.4 million library items to over

685 000 library users in 2020. Our
library stock is worth R461 million.

Since 2019, 11 libraries for the blind have opened, bringing the total to 28 in the Western Cape.

# PROMOTING CULTURE IN THE WESTERN CAPE FOR YOU

We trained 223
cultural practitioners
responsible for customary
male initiations in
COVID-19 infection
prevention and control
measures to manage the
spread of the virus when
the initiation schools were
permitted to reopen under
national regulations.

While there have been significantly fewer initiation schools operational because of disaster act restrictions, the Western Cape recorded a 99.86% safe passage rate in 2019/20, with 100% in 2020/21.

In partnership with the University
of the Western Cape and Heal
the Hood, we started a process to
develop a Kaaps-English Bilingual
Dictionary. This initiative will develop
linguistic and literacy resources for
Kaaps speakers in South Africa, with
specialised training and workshops
for the development of the KaapsEnglish terminology to be rolled out.

8 new Provincial Heritage Sites were unveiled since 2019.

### SUPPORTING SPORT IN THE WESTERN CAPE FOR YOU

The number of coaches trained has increased to 1 242, assisting with the professionalisation of sport in the province.

Currently, 180 clubs have been supported through our Club Development Programme which includes clubs from rural and farming communities.

For this financial year, we have allocated funding for a new Multipurpose Centre in Prince Albert, dual netball and tennis courts in Swellendam and two new combi courts in Swartland. This follows funding provided to Swartland Municipality for the upgrading of sport facilities in Darling, Kalbaskraal and Malmesbury in 2019/20 financial year.

In 2019/2020, we allocated funding to Theewaterskloof Cape has increased from 129 in 2019/2020 to 138 in 2020/21.

In 2019/2020, we allocated funding to Theewaterskloof Municipality for the new Mountain Bike facility, as well as the construction of 2 Netball Courts in Mossel Bay.

As part of the successful bid for the hosting of the Netball World Cup in 2023, we have committed to upgrade and build facilities in the province.

R13.5 million has been earmarked over 2020/21, 2021/22 and 2022/23 financial years.

We translated the Netball Rulebook into isiXhosa as a part of our Netball Legacy Project. We are currently completing the translation of the Boxing Rule Book, which will be completed this year.

### GOOD GOVERNANCE FOR BETTER DELIVERY, FOR YOU

In the 2020/21 financial year, the Department of Local Government spent 95% of the Municipal Infrastructure Grant, which is focussed on delivering services to lower income communities. Since the start of the 2019/20 financial year, over R800 million of this grant has been spent to date.

In the 2019/20 financial year, 70% of departments and entities received clean audits, compared to the next best province, Gauteng, with 30% clean audits and the worst performing province, the North West, with 4% clean audits.

We incurred **no unauthorised expenditure**, compared to the
next best province, Limpopo, with
R1.13 million in unauthorised expenditure, and
the worst performing province, the Eastern Cape,
with R1.58 billion in unauthorised expenditure.

Over 90% of the 30 municipalities in the Western Cape received either clean or unqualified audit opinions for the 2019/2020 financial year, with 19 out of the 30 municipalities receiving clean audit opinions. Altogether, municipalities in the Western Cape are responsible for 75% of the clean audits granted countrywide in 2019/20.

Ratings Afrika has found the best performing municipalities in South Africa are in the Western Cape. The same report found that the top performing Metro Municipality in the country was the City of Cape Town, in the Western Cape.

## GOOD GOVERNANCE FOR BETTER DELIVERY, FOR YOU

The State of Local Government
Report was tabled at the National
Cabinet on 30 June 2021, where
COGTA reported that we
registered the highest number
of "Stable Municipalities"
and the lowest number of
"Dysfunctional municipalities"
in the Country.

47.9% of the Western
Cape households receive free basic sewerage and sanitation services, which is more than double the national average of 18.7% of households.

The Western Cape provides 42.5% of households with free basic water, which is nearly double the national average of 21.8% of households.

23% of Western Cape households receive free basic electricity, which is far higher than the average of 16.7% of households.



The provincial RSEP programme is supporting neighbourhood development and integration in 18 towns across the

Province. This multi-pronged programme provides safe pedestrian walkways and innovative recreational and trading facilities.

R57 million has been committed by the WCG to these projects since 2019.

## PROTECTING YOU AND THE ENVIRONMENT THROUGH DISASTER MANAGEMENT

The Western Cape's fire and rescue services have supported municipal fire services to contain at least 25% of all wildfires within the initial attack time frame of one hour through specialised aerial and ground support.

The Fire Service Capacity
Building Grant has enabled
municipalities in the Western
Cape to acquire 62 fire
fighting vehicles since 2017.
This represents a capital
investment of nearly
R54 million, over this
period.

Nearly 11 000 smoke alarms have been installed in informal settlements throughout the Province since the project's commencement in 2017 in order to prevent fires.

The Western Cape has the only actively trained officials who form part of a United Nations Disaster Assessment and Coordination Team.

The development and implementation of the Western Cape Drowning Prevention and Water Safety Strategy is the first of its kind in South Africa. This is the only Provincial Centre, through the Department of Local Government, to financially support the NSRI and Lifesaving in the Western Cape with an annual grant.

The Western Cape Department of Local Government spent about R170 million on drought related projects in the past four 4 years from 2017 to 2021 and continues to provide ongoing support to the Department of Agriculture.

We have also established a hazard awareness campaign, which has reached nearly 204 614 learners in 448 primary schools between 2010 to 2020.

In response to the COVID-19 pandemic, the provincial Disaster Management centre was activated to co-ordinate our response. The Centre opened on 25 March 2020 - 24/7, including public holidays; working 12-hour shifts with 100% of the staff compliment working in teams.

The Centre oversaw a total of 107 COVID-19 Joint Operation Committee Meetings, with 198 COVID-19 Situation Reports generated and disseminated.

#### PROVIDING HUMANITARIAN SUPPORT FOR YOU

As part of the immediate emergency food relief intervention following the lockdown, our Department of Social Development distributed 55 977 food parcels. This benefited 224 000 beneficiaries.

Over 46 647 Social Relief of Distress tickets were lodged by the Western Cape's Contact Centre between 1 April and 6 July 2020, to help residents' access SASSA's support.



Our feeding programme was expanded during the COVID-19 pandemic with 411 020 meals provided in 2020/21 benefiting 205 510 women, 82 204 men and 123 306 children.

Our One Home One Garden programme has benefited 6 629 households, helping to ensure food security.

Community Nutrition and Development centres provided meals to 14 685 people in 2020/2021 up from 6092 in 2019/2020.



# PROVIDING SOCIAL SUPPORT TO VULNERABLE COMMUNITIES FOR YOU

We have grown our network of funding substance abuse treatment services since 2019, with 54 organisations now funded to render substance abuse interventions.

67 NGOs are now rendering specialised support services from the Western Cape Government, up from 50 NGOs in 2019.

We have increased the number of bed spaces in homeless shelters from 1 500 in 2019/20 to 2 500 currently.

We have also increased the number of homeless shelters funded, from 27 in 2019 to 33 in 2021. Funding for this important programme has increased from R15 million to R35 million over this period.

The number of social work professionals has increased to 1548 across the province. This is up from 1510 social work professionals in 2019 and 505 in 2009.

To support old age homes during the COVID-19 pandemic, over R1.7 million was provided to 117 funded homes. 120 000 face masks, and 50 litres of sanitiser/home were distributed.

We also developed detailed guidelines for the management of COVID-19 at these care facilities, with specialised training provided to carers.

#### PROTECTING THE ENVIRONMENT FOR YOU

We have established the Western Cape Climate Change Response Strategy: Vision 2050. This transversal strategy will provide policy direction in response to climate-related risks and potential opportunities.

Our Riparian Zone
Rehabilitation programme
in the Berg and Breede
catchments continues.
This programme remains
the first-of-its-kind.
This also creates EPWP job
opportunities as a muchneeded stimulus to benefit
local communities.

We have undertaken the Water Sensitive Cities Benchmarking and Implementation strategy as a joint project between the WCG and the City of Cape Town.

The Western
Cape Biodiversity
Bill was submitted
to the Western Cape

Provincial Parliament
in December 2020 and
has now entered the
parliamentary phase of
the legislative process.

Our Ecological Infrastructure Investment Framework has provided an important mechanism for the co-ordination of investment into priority ecological infrastructure. This enables the most strategic returns in addressing climate and water risks.

Cape Nature continues to develop important eco-tourism products, with the upgrade and development of 11 facilities.

The entity was recently recognised as a finalist in the Reignite Africa Awards for its #NatureStaycation marketing campaign.

52 869 hectares of water-sapping alien vegetation has been cleared out of CapeNature reserves, improving our water security between 2019 and 2021, improving our water saving.

## CREATING SAFER MORE RELIABLE PUBLIC TRANSPORT FOR YOU

We pioneered the Red Dot and Red Dot Lite Service, which provides safe evening transport for public sector healthcare workers home from their places of work during the COVID-19 pandemic.

During the first 8 months of the pandemic, the Red Dot Lite services transported 173 000 healthcare workers from 25 healthcare facilities in the Cape Metro. This service has also transported 27 800 people to and from public quarantine and isolation facilities, 3 500 people to and from vaccine sites, and 3 500 discharged patients from hospitals.

The Blue Dot taxi pilot programme is also a first for South Africa, incentivising better taxi services by participating drivers. This programme saw 8 new companies established, with over 519 operators and 924 drivers trained.

949 vehicles were branded and fitted with a tracker, and 79 vehicles and their owners are now eligible to earn Blue Dot incentive payments. This programme electronically monitored over 11 000 00 km of minibus taxi operations from 1 June 2021 to the end of September 2021.

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Although the management of rail does not rest with the province, we have worked to improve rail reserves, infrastructure assets and clear vegetation overgrowth by working with the national entity PRASA. We have provided a total of R10 million to fund these improvements and hope having more influence on MetroRail this way, will assist in improving it.

The Western Cape has deployed over 100 law enforcement officers to the rail network, and we have invested R17 million towards additional security officials on trains. Since 2019, there have been 793 operations, 503 arrests, over 4 000m of cable has been recovered, over 1365 confiscations made, 5 066 hotspot visits, and 52 203 searches conducted.

# CREATING SAFER MORE RELIABLE PUBLIC TRANSPORT FOR YOU

We have invested over **R6 billion** on road infrastructure since 2019. Half on maintaining our existing network, and half on construction.

The GO GEORGE service currently conveys in excess of 315 000 passenger trips per month, with pproximately 3.78 million passengers per annum.

Since 2019, the vehicle operating company for GO GEORGE, George Link (Pty) Ltd, has permanently employed 356 staff, of which 258 are bus drivers.

Our Integrated Transport Hub (ITH) which is linked to our camera system (including in vehicle cameras) and handheld devices given to officers operates 24/7 and provides officers with real-time verified alerts and information.

Vehicles of interest are flagged within our ITH and when passing any of our static cameras or in vehicle cameras triggers an alert to our nearest officer or to the officer in the vehicle.

We have a total of 13
Traffic Centres across
the province and our
operational deployment
is on all of our major
national routes as well as
at our 7 weighbridges.
