In this conversation you will have the opportunity to hear from, and enjoy Q&A, with our star guest, **Clinton Naina**, creator of 'Stolen Climate'. Clinton joins us in person all the way from Australia for this event, to discuss the meaning behind his work and his artistic practice, which exposes the impact of British settlement on his people from the Torres Strait Islands. Prof **Jay Mistry**, an expert on wildfires and Indigenous geographies at Royal Holloway, will join the conversation on fire, climate and colonialism, chaired by Dr **Chris Fremantle** (Gray's School of Art) who works at the interface of ecology and art.
