Family centre open

The Welshpool Integrated Family Centre was officially opened last month by Deputy Minister for Social Services Julie Morgan.

The centre opened its doors in October last year as a "one stop shop" providing services and support to children, young people and their families. It provides activities such as parent and toddler groups, baby massage, information and advice, Incredible Years Parenting Training programmes, health advice, family support and counselling.

This is the second Integrated Family Centre to open in the county and is part of a wider ambition to develop a series of similar sites across Powys.

The new Health and Wellbeing Wales App provides offline access to information about a wide range of local and national organisations, groups and services. The information is brought together from Dewis Cymru, Infoengine and the NHS Direct Wales resource directories.

The App is aimed at staff from a range of organisations and is only available to registered users with an e-mail address from one of the approved organisations.

CARERS' VOICE

Unpaid carers play a vital role in looking after some of our most vulnerable citizens in Powys. Work is underway locally and nationally to recognise and support young and adult unpaid carers to live their best lives whilst caring for a friend or family member.

Two key priorities have been identified by Powys carers:



To raise the profile of carers in Powys

To provide respite breaks to support them to carry on caring

Local charity Credu, are leading on two projects to address these priorities, with funding allocated by Powys RPB as part of the Welsh Government's Regional Integration Fund.

The Raising Awareness project has enhanced the way hidden carers are identified and supported in Powys. The Co producing Respite Project complements this work and has enabled creative community based respite opportunities within the county.

Carers who have been part of these projects share their stories with us. Mandy, a mum who is a carer for her daughter with complex needs, talks about the strength she has found as a carer and the support she's been given by the community.



You can also hear from a young carer called Ffion. Ffion cares for both her parents and is active in local and national young carer groups. Ffion has gained a lot from connecting with other young carers and continues to speak out and raise awareness of issues faced by herself and others.


